Section 27-176(h)(2) *Nomination of landmarks and historic districts. When nominating a property or area as a landmark or historic district the application shall address the following criteria:*

- a. Its character, interest, or value as part of the development, heritage, or cultural characteristics of the community, county, state, or country.
- b. Its location as a site of a significant local, county, state, or national event.
- c. Its identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the community, county, state, or country.
- d. Its embodiment of distinguishing characteristics of an architectural style valuable for the study of a period, type, method of construction, or use of indigenous materials.
- e. Its identification as the work of a master builder, designer, architect, or landscape architect whose individual work has influenced the development of the community, county, state, or country.
- f. Its embodiment of elements of design, detailing, materials, or craftsmanship which renders it architecturally significant.
- g. Its embodiment of design elements that make it structurally or architecturally innovative.
- h. Its unique location or singular physical characteristics that make it an established or familiar visual feature of the neighborhood, community, or city; or the fact that it has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in history.
- i. Its character as a particularly fine or unique example of a utilitarian structure, including but not limited to, farmhouses, gas stations or other commercial structures, with a high level of integrity or architectural significance.
- j. Its overall setting and harmony as a collection of buildings, structures, or objects where the overall collection forms a unit.
- k. Its suitability for preservation or restoration and its potential to be returned to an accurate historic appearance regardless of alterations or insensitive treatment that can be demonstrated to be reversible.
